Fidel Castro's Reflection: We Have Lost Our Best Friend

The best friend the Cuban people have had throughout their history died on the afternoon of March 5. A call via satellite communicated the bitter news. The significance of the phrase used was unmistakable.

Although we were aware of the critical state of his health, the news hit us hard. I recalled the times he joked with me, saying that when both of us had concluded our revolutionary task, he would invite me to walk by the Arauca River in Venezuelan territory, which made him remember the rest that he never had.

The honor befell us to have shared with the Bolivarian leader the same ideas of social justice and support for the exploited. The poor are the poor in any part of the world.

"Let Venezuela give me a way of serving her: she has in me a son," proclaimed National Hero José Martí, the leader of our independence, a traveler who, without cleansing himself of the dust of the journey, asked for the location of the statue of Bolívar.

Martí knew the beast because he lived in its entrails. Is it possible to ignore the pro-

found words he voiced in an inconclusive letter to his friend Manuel Mercado the day before he died in battle? " I am in daily danger of giving my life for my country and duty - for I understand that duty and have the intention of carrying it out - the duty of preventing the United States from extending through the Antilles as Cuba gains its independence, and from falling, with that additional strength, upon our lands of America. All that I have done thus far, and will do, is for this purpose. I have had to work silently and somewhat indirectly because, there are certain things which, in order to attain them, have to remain concealed."

At that time, 66 years had passed since the Liberator Simón Bolívar wrote, "the United States would seem to be destined by fate to plague the Americas with miseries in the name of freedom."

On January 23, 1959, 22 days after the revolutionary triumph in Cuba, I visited Venezuela to thank its people and the government which assumed power after the Pérez Jiménez dictatorship, for the dispatch of 150 rifles at the end of 1958. I said at that time:

"...Venezuela is the homeland of the Liberator, where the idea of the union of the peoples of America was conceived. Therefore. Venezuela must be the country to lead the union of the peoples of America; as Cubans, we support our brothers and sisters in Venezuela.

"I have spoken of these ideas not because I am moved by any kind of personal ambition, or even the ambition of glory, because, at the end of the day, ambitions of

glory remain a vanity, and as Martí said, "All the glory of the world fits into a kernel of corn."

"And so, upon coming here to talk in this way to the people of Venezuela, I do so thinking honorably and deeply, that if we want to save America, if we want to save the freedom of each one of our societies that, at the end of the day, are part of one great society, which is the soci-

ety of Latin America; if it is that we want to save the revolution

of Cuba, the revolution of Venezuela and the revolution of all the countries on our continent, we have to come closer to each other and we have to solidly support each other, because alone and divided, we will fail."

That is what I said on that day and today, 54 years later, I endorse it!

I must only include on that list the other nations of the world which. for more than half a century, have been victims of exploitation and







plunder. That was the struggle of Hugo Chávez.

Not even he himself suspected how great he was.

;Until victory forever (Hasta la victoria siempre), unforgettable friend!

THE 612 candidates for deputies to the National Assembly of People's Power and the 1,269 candidates for delegates to the 15 Provincial Assemblies of People's Power, were elected on February 3, according to information given by Alina Balseiro Gutiérrez, president of the National Electoral Commission (CEN), in a press conference.

Once again, Cubans exercised their universal, free and democratic right to elect their representatives, she affirmed.

Gutiérrez announced the preliminary figures, given that some votes still are to be validated over the next few days, stating that 7,877,906 people voted, 89.68% of those eligible.

Of the votes cast, 7,418,522 were valid, (94.17%); 364,576 were blank (4.63%) and 94,808 (1.20%) were spoiled.

With reference to the elected deputies, she noted that their average age is 48; 48.86% are female and 46.4% are members of Municipal Assemblies of People's Power.

Regarding the provincial delegates, their average age is 45; 50.5% are female and 46.4% are municipal delegates.

Balseiro highlighted that election day activities went according to plan: the 29,957 polling stations opened at 7:00am; those staffing the tables ensured transparency in the voting; electoral authorities undertook their responsibility ethically in accordance with the law; the communications and information functioned as intended; and the rest of the arrangements went ahead as expected.

Finally, on behalf of the CEN, she thanked all those who voted for their participation, electoral authorities and commissions for their dedication, and the support staff, state bodies and other mass organizations for their contributions. "In summary, we wish to express our appreciation to all our people for the success of this process.

The CEN president was accompanied by vice president Rubén Pérez Rodríguez; Tomás Amarán Díaz, secretary; and members Julio Torres García, Raúl Van Troi Navarro and Heriberto Rosabal Espinosa.

HAVANA, Jan 29 2013 (IPS) - Cuban diplomacy will be working full blast this year, promoting its own approach to integration in line with the needs and goals of the Community of Latin American and Caribbean States (CELAC), a regional body that excludes the United States, Cuba's leading ideological opponent.

It is precisely this independence from Washington that most attracts Havana to CELAC, whose presidency will be occupied until 2014 by Cuban President Raúl Castro, together with Chilean President Sebastián Piñera and Costa Rican President Laura Chinchilla.

By special resolution, this threepronged presidency will be supplemented by Haitian President Michel Martelly, who also heads

the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) this year.

CELAC is a diverse, plural and politically and ideologically tolerant bloc that gathers all the countries of Latin America and the Caribbean. Thus the challenge put to member countries even before CELAC's founding meeting is to tread carefully and find a path of agreement and consensus, with the overall aim of moving forward towards regional integration and growth, striving, in particular, to achieve a socially-just economic development.

"We undertake to work for peace, justice and development for Latin America and the Caribbean, and for cooperation, understanding and solidarity among all Latin American and Caribbean peoples," Castro said on Monday, upon taking office as CELAC president, but acknowledged that regional unity must be built on the recognition of the region's diversity.

The 33-country bloc closed its first formal summit on Monday in the Chilean capital of Santiago, and has scheduled its second summit for a year from now, in Cuba. The Cuban government has been a strong supporter of the regional integration body since the idea for its creation first came up four years ago, at the Latin American and Caribbean Summit on Integration and Development held in Brazil.

That 2008 summit, the first regional meeting of its kind to be organised without engaging the United States and Canada, was followed two years later in 2010 by a similar gathering, this time in Mexico, where participant countries agreed to create CELAC. The bloc was finally founded the following year at a third meeting in Caracas.

Cuba made its preference for a U.S.-free integration known in June 2009 when the United States voted against the Caribbean island's request to be reinstated as a member of the Organisation of American States, from which it was suspended by consensus in 1962 after embracing Marxism-Leninism.

The Castro administration also stepped up its active involvement in forums that represent the countries of the region, including Caribbean island nations.

Venezuelan Consul General in Vancouver Merli Vanegas is a Bolivarian and socialist lawyer. On January 10th, hundreds of thousands of people took to the streets throughout

Venezuela to show their support for legally elected President Hugo Chavez as well as for the Bolivarian Revolution. Between January 22nd and January 31st, people around the world did the same and organized diverse events as part of an International Week of Action in Solidarity with Venezuela.

After another decisive win by Hugo Chavez in the recent Venezuelan Presidential Elections, the U.S. backed right-wing opposition in Venezuela is trying to use his health situation to attack the Bolivarian Revolution and set back the huge gains made by poor and working people since Chavez was first elected in 1998.

Many people joined the Vancouver actions to demonstrate the huge love and solidarity people around the world have for President Chavez, and also to help educate people about the realities of the huge gains of the Bolivarian Revolution in Venezuela!

harmonising these bodies and groups is the path chosen by Cuba; (no longer holding on to) the impossible illusion of returning to an organisation that refuses to reform and has been condemned by history," Castro said.

Cuba is a founding member of the Bolivarian Alliance for the Peoples of Our America (ALBA), of which Antigua and Barbuda, Bolivia, Dominica, Ecuador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Saint Vincent and the Grenadines, and Venezuela are also members. It also has close and active political and cooperation ties with CARICOM.

Cooperation with countries of the South is one of the strengths of Cuba's foreign policy, a strategy which opens up significant opportunities for Latin America and the Caribbean to implement major projects despite limited resources.

"We all have advantages and experiences that we can contribute," Cuban Foreign Minister Bruno Rodríguez said shortly before the Santiago summit.

As an example of this, Rodríguez mentioned the assistance provided by his country to Haiti, which focuses particularly on health aid.

Solidarity is, in fact, the principle chosen by Cuba to guide cooperation among the countries of the region, moving away from conditions imposed from outside that have no place in a "new Latin America", Deputy Foreign Minister Abelardo Moreno added.

While Cuba strengthens its regional environment, expectations that its relations with the United States will improve with the second administration of Democrat Barack Obama are low. Several commentators in the interactive Café 108 feature of the IPS Cuba website agreed that there is little chance that the U.S. will reconsider its relations with Cuba.

In the opinion of political scien-

part, does not expect to see any change "in the suspended state of relations between the two neighbouring nations, which have been enemies since the early 1960s."

"Obama has too many pending issues to address - immigration, fiscal reform. a war and other
